For some, the issue at stake is, if we go along with the rest of the world, how can we lead others to Christ? For others, it's by being welcoming and accepting that we do lead people to Christ. All of these are very valid questions that need to be worked out.

I knew going into this that there weren't going to be any easy answers, but I am so grateful that we've been able to sit down together and discuss it in a spirit of love, fellowship, and Christian charity. We will keep you informed as we continue on in this process, and please keep us in your prayers.


Let me say for the record: I LOVE CHRISTMAS!





Vestry Meeting Summary of Action

Vestry Meeting—November 18, 2015

Summary of Action

Finance Report—Dosh Jackson: We have made progress since last summer on the deficit, which is down to \$2,514. Appreciation was expressed to donors to the 20-40-60 Campaign, which has raised \$3,927. Income of \$11,821 for October was lower than normal; expenditures for the month were \$572 more than income. The cash flow continues to be a concern, since we operate on a month-to-month basis (nearly two-thirds of the amount in the checking account consists of restricted funds); this is an ongoing, systemic issue. Discussion focused on celebrating the good things St. Francis does, largely due to the work of volunteers, and on sharing the life of Christ as Disciples Making Disciples. Successful outreach efforts, such as Trunk-or-Treat, and fundraisers, such as the Faux Fashion Show, which raised \$870 for ECW outreach, were cited.

The proposed 2016 budget will be presented at the December Vestry meeting.

Those who have made in-kind contributions to the church should fill out the tax forms by the end of the year.

LGBT Discussion Task Force—Fr. Conor: The six-week Sunday morning Bible Study on Romans will wrap up this coming week; healthy, encouraging conversations with a variety of opinions have occurred. This is a beginning for the broader conversation and eventual decision by the parish; the LGBT Discussion Task Force will reconvene to follow up.

Episcopal Church Policy on Alcohol—The Vestry reviewed and adopted the new policy presented by the Task Force to Review and Revise Policy on Substance Abuse, Addiction and Recovery and passed at the 78th General Convention of the Episcopal Church, 2015. The Bishop has asked all churches in the diocese to follow the policy, which can be found at (http://images.acswebnetworks.com/1/2279/AlcoholPolicy.pdf). The relevant passages were added to the Rental Agreement for the Parish Hall.

Ministry Area Reports

- Senior Warden—Susan Moore: On Sunday, December 6, at 6 pm, our church family will host "God Bless Us Every One," a dinner with activities for children and a cookie exchange, to reach out to newcomers and people helped by the Food Pantry. Peace and Pie with Emmanuel Lutheran Church will be held at St. Francis at 7 pm on November 22, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.
- Junior Wardens—Ron Simmons: The HVAC system work will be scheduled in the next two weeks. Fall Leaf Clean-up will be Saturday morning, November 28.
- **Communications**—Robert Savage: A link to the Presiding Bishop's November 1 installation will be put on the website. A new router extension for wifi has been installed.
- **Stewardship**—Ken Clarke: Pledge cards are to be turned in by December 6. The ECW plans to hold a rummage sale and bake sale in January.
