# Who Picked That Song, anyway?

Music has been an integral part of Christian worship in general, and Anglican worship in particular, for centuries. The legacy of music the Episcopal Church in America inherited from our Anglican cousins is broad, deep and majestic. In our hymns, our service music, and our anthems we use music to enhance the worship experience and support each of us along our individual spiritual journeys.

That said, how do we choose the songs that we use, and what's the rationale (if any!) behind those choices? It would be easy to say, "We're Episcopalians ... we've *always* done it that way!" but there is really a little more behind it.

It might be helpful to look at the role of music in a worship service, specifically at Saint Francis. We all have our own spiritual treks, and, like travel in general, there are many ways to accomplish that. If we were travelling from, say, Virginia Beach to a place like Boston, we could do that in a number of ways – by car, by train, by airplane, by boat, on foot ... any number of possibilities. Based on our own needs and preferences, we choose a means that is meaningful to us. Another person might choose another method, and both would be equally valid. What is right for me, or preferred by me, might not have the same impact on someone else. No big deal. Music is not too far removed from that. People have individual preferences in styles of music and (naturally) prefer to hear something in their style more so than others.

Let's begin with the hymns. The Episcopal Church has a series of hymns for each Sunday, tied in most instances to the Scripture lesson(s) for that day. The Rector uses that as a guide to choose music for processing, recessing, and to introduce the Gospel reading (technical term: The Gradual Hymn). The Rector may adjust that if desired to acknowledge an event, a holiday, or really for any good reason. By and large, though, they tend to stick with the suggested hymns.

Ditto service music (you know, the stuff to which we chant). Scan the hymnal in the "S" section (not during the sermon ... you should be paying attention!) and you'll see some of the dozens of options. Almost an embarrassment of riches, don't you think? If you were to attend a service at another Episcopal church, you might hear the same part of the service being chanted to a different arrangement. Still, I'm pretty certain that God hears all of them.

That brings us to the anthem (you know, that piece that's done while the ushers take up the offering). At Saint Francis, the choice of the anthem begins with the Music Director and is then approved by the Rector. (Sometimes we pretend the choir is a democracy and take a vote ... doesn't happen often, though.) The way it is selected is based first on the Scripture lesson for that day. If you were to search the Internet on RCL – Vanderbilt you'd find a killer web site hosted by Vanderbilt University that lists all the scripture readings for each of the church years – A, B, or C. Using that as a jumping-off point, we try to find something that will support the message, that can be presented acceptably, and that fits within our choir structure. We've been able to build a pretty robust library of anthems from which to select, and there are all sorts of other venues. As good stewards, we endeavor to find those that fit within our budgetary limits and have been generally successful over the years. Like the choice of hymns, we can make other selections that commemorate special occasions, themes or people. The only criteria are that it be appropriate for church and have some value in supporting our mission. (continued on page 4)

The beauty of the Episcopal Church is the staggering number of options we have. We can draw from the musical classics to more contemporary compositions to the rich and exciting world of Gospel and Spiritual. The church is constantly reviewing options and is actually pretty good at sanctioning certain pieces (did you know, for example, that Bob Marley's "One Love" is an approved piece? Pretty neat, no?) Sometimes we can supplement the vocal element of our anthems with instrumental accompaniments that enhance the experience – yeah, that includes bagpipes, too!

We began a program at Saint Francis some years ago that offers the option of dedicating an anthem. You can make a nominal donation (or not) and dedicate a piece to commemorate a person or event. We'll acknowledge that in the bulletin every time the piece is offered. (For example, one of our parishioners – who shall remain un-named – is particularly fond of Antonín Dvořák's "Going Home." You'll know that her husband is trying to earn some points by scheduling it for her!)

Like the possibilities of physical travel, we have a wide variety of musical styles to support our own quest for goodness and adherence to the teachings of Christ. Don't be reluctant to let the Music Director know your preference – at the very least he'll listen to you!





# Vestry Meeting Summary of Action

Vestry Meeting—December 17, 2014

#### • Strategic Plan Update--Fr. Conor & Dosh Jackson

The team will take the goals breakout from the vision document and compare it with the feedback from the town hall and other meetings to find the items that people have a lot of energy around, which seems to be the action-oriented items. The team came up with three things for which Vestry support is needed.

For every initiative we pursue, we need a Vestry member's presence.

Each Vestry member will take on an area and be the driving force to make it happen.

All Vestry members need to verbally support all activities.

#### • **Stewardship** –Ken Clarke

We are still getting pledges in; 60-70 percent are needed in order to formulate next year's budget, and we're not quite there. Pledge envelopes will be put out early, and information on automatic deduction will be available.

#### • Communications – Robert Savage

The Faithful Bell will be coming back, but will be reinvented. It was being sent by email, as we have not had the budget for mailing.

# • Outreach –Flavel Blyden

The Food Pantry is full now. It will be open for Social Services December 22-24, and will have an open week later on. We are looking into a project with Episcopal Relief and Development for Lent.

# • Finance Update –Dosh Jackson

The conclusion of last year's audit was that the church and congregation are to be commended for their hard work. The Vestry improved financial processes and refinanced. Overall, it's a good report, and Dosh is thankful to all who contributed and to God.

Since we do not have enough pledges to formulate next year's budget, the Vestry voted to continue the 2014 budget into January in order to pay the bills.
